

"Clean up in Aisle 7!"



My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Can the interpretation of our sacred story be summarized with the phrase, "clean up in aisle 7?" Our sacred story as it is recorded in the Scriptures begins with two very different accounts of creation in the first two chapters of the Book of Genesis. There are divine proclamations of goodness, evolving grandeur, and childlike innocence. Each story is a beautiful portrayal of a sacred universe confidently spinning out into the unknown! Then comes the third chapter of Genesis and the story of the Fall with its talking snake, forbidden tree, and the loss of innocence. In our traditional interpretation of our sacred story, the Fall sets the trajectory of the "rest of the story" as Paul Harvey called it. From this perspective, the entire story of the Bible except for the first two chapters of Genesis can be summarized by the phrase, "clean up in aisle 7." The way that we have told our sacred story is that it is a rescue mission. Jesus is God's plan B! Although we have couched it in positive terms, it is basically a negative story about sin management and appeasing an angry God. God's grace is amazing because it saves a "wretch" like me! That's not a very positive or healthy self-image (As you can tell "Amazing Grace" is not my favorite hymn!).

Is this essentially negative interpretation of our sacred story one of the reasons that people are not embracing Christianity and why the church alumni organization is one of the fastest growing religious groups today? We as Christians are so embedded in the story as we have always interpreted it, that we may not even be aware that there may be other ways of telling the story. The Bible can be interpreted in a variety of ways on a continuum from totally non-literal at one end to totally literal at the other end and everything else in-between. My approach to the Scriptures is that the events and characters that are portrayed may have historical cores with interpretative stories wrapped around them. Abraham, for example, may represent a historical figure, but as his story was recounted, interpretive stories were added which made him appear to be "larger than life." Just look at the story in the eighteenth chapter of Genesis where Abraham bargains with God over the fate of Sodom and Gomorrah. In this story, Abraham appears to be more merciful than God! Embellishing the stories of folk heroes is not unusual even in the Bible!

Let's take another look then at the third chapter of Genesis which describes what traditionally has been described as the Fall. It is interesting to note that this book and chapter are an integral part of the Jewish Scriptures and yet the overly negative interpretation complete with a notion of original sin comes from Christianity! What if the third chapter of Genesis is not a Fall story, but a "coming of age" story? Do we all eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil and thereby lose our innocence? Is this simply a normal part of human development? Is this story simply an allegorical, mythical tale of human development that conveys the truth about the loss of innocence, our incompleteness, and our lifelong search for wholeness? Would interpreting the story this way take us on a whole new trajectory through the rest of the Bible? Could our sacred story have a different, more positive spin? Perhaps we can do better than "clean up in aisle 7!"

Cluster Outreach Collection May/June 2018

Throughout May and June the Luther Cluster congregations will gather items for "Things of My Very Own" (TOMVO), a non-profit organization located in Schenectady, that provides crisis intervention services to children who have been impacted by extensive abuse and/or neglect.

They also provide services to children at-risk of a Child Protective Services intervention where families don't have items necessary for sustainability. The organization works to keep children with their non-abusive family members and out of the foster care system whenever possible.

The transition out of an abusive situation is often sudden and unexpected. Rarely is a child able to return home to retrieve belongings prior to the move. TOMVO recognizes the need for children to have "things of their very own," even when they are in an unfamiliar setting.
